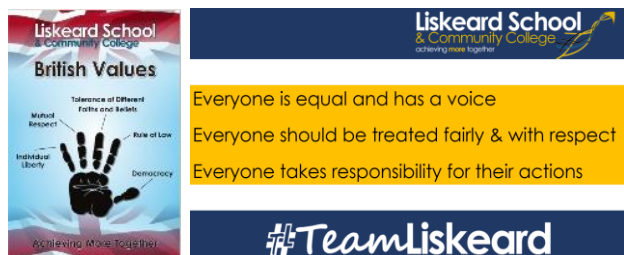


## British Values at Liskeard School and Community College

British Values	Some examples at of how these are taught at Liskeard School
<b>Individual liberty</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students get to choose their GCSE and A Level options.</li> <li>• Termly student surveys, and participation in student leadership opportunities such as Tutor, Year, school and trust councils ensure the student voice is heard.</li> <li>• Students have the freedom to attend a wide range of extra-curricular activities &amp; trips, including a Democracy trip to London in Year 9 where students visit places of worship and the Houses of Parliament. <a href="#">London Democracy Trip</a></li> </ul>
<b>Democracy</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students are taught about politics in PHSE and how a democratic political system works.</li> <li>• Students vote for your Student Council reps.</li> <li>• Students are given opportunities to vote at mock general elections, including attending hustings with local MPS and councillors.</li> <li>• Students can take part in debating and public speaking competitions.</li> </ul>
<b>The Rule of Law</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students follow rules on a day-to-day basis within school, as well as understanding the consequences of breaking them.</li> <li>• Students are taught about the law within society, e.g. Human Rights, in EPW and PSHE.</li> <li>• Students have the opportunity to take part in the Mock Magistrates competitions via the English Faculty.</li> <li>• Regular assemblies from the Police on local, regional and national issues.</li> </ul>
<b>Mutual Respect</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students are taught about 'healthy relationships', anti-bullying, sexuality, identity and the importance of respecting individuality.</li> <li>• Students receive sessions from Barnardo's, CLEAR and Brook.</li> <li>• Mutual respect forms an integral part of the Relationship and BfL processes.</li> <li>• Assemblies and ongoing foci on our social norms, looking out for each other and reporting concerns (#See something, say something).</li> </ul>
<b>Tolerance of those with different faiths and/or beliefs</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students attend EPW lessons in which topics covering Christianity, Islam, anti-racism and prevention of extremism are taught. These topics allow students the opportunity to discuss ideas and viewpoints that they may agree or disagree with, but ultimately help them to reflect on their own views and appreciate that others may think or feel differently.</li> <li>• Tolerance forms an integral part of the Relationship and BfL processes.</li> </ul>
